# Motivation and Emotion meets Metacognition and Self-regulated Learning



## Types of Contributions and Sessions

We invite the submission of individual contributions (i.e., papers; posters), and symposia. Both empirical and theoretical proposals grounded in the current state of the art are welcomed.

#### **Paper**

Paper sessions include oral presentations of four papers, followed by a discussion with the audience. Each session is scheduled for 90 minutes. Four presenters are each given 15 minutes presentation time followed by five minutes for questions. At the end of the paper sessions, there is a 10-minute open discussion.

To be accepted, empirical papers must contain research questions grounded in the state of the art, data, methods, and results. Theoretical papers are welcome if they build on a synthesis of prior work, and reveal open issues for future research. Research at its earlier stages is most suitable for poster sessions.

#### **Poster**

Poster sessions offer the chance to visually and graphically present findings from empirical and conceptual work. They provide manifold opportunities to engage in interaction and discussion with colleagues. Posters are ideal for both, work in advanced and earlier stages. Furthermore, they provide room for presenting novel and promising ideas. The poster sessions will be assigned to specific time slots with no other parallel sessions in order to provide space for interaction and discussion.

The overlapping day of the joint conference will include an Open Research Market to both the SIG 8 and the SIG 16 community. If you would like to share your research there, please submit your contribution as a poster, and indicate during the submission process that you would like to present on the overlapping day.

#### **Symposium**

Symposia provide an opportunity to present research on one topic, often from multiple perspectives, compiling a coherent set of papers for discussion. Symposia sessions are directed by a chair, involving 4 presenters and a discussant, from at least three different countries. A symposium will be submitted by the symposium-organizer as a whole. The symposium submission should include a description of the symposium (250 words) as well as the single papers' abstracts and extended summaries for all the papers to be presented as part of the symposium. We recommend that each individual submission is checked in terms of quality, relevance, and coherence to the topic of the symposium.

Each symposium is scheduled for 90 minutes, allowing approximately 12-15 minutes of presentation time per speaker, 15 minutes for the discussant, and 15 minutes for open discussion.

#### **Submission Policies**

Note that in order to provide as many researchers as possible with the opportunity to present their work at the joint conference, we have to restrict the number of active contributions for each person. Thus, we encourage you to submit only one proposal as a presenting author. The submission system will not allow more than two. In addition, you can act once as the chair of a symposium and once as a discussant. We also warmly welcome you to serve as a chair for a conference session (not including symposia), by signing up for this role through the submission system. Moreover, you may participate as a non-presenting co-author for further contributions.

All presenting authors of accepted papers and all participants in accepted sessions (presenting authors, chairs, and discussants) are expected to register by March,  $4^{th}$ , 2020, to attend the conference, and to be present at the scheduled sessions.

#### Submission Guidelines and Procedure

All proposals must be in English and submitted electronically through the EARLI submission system: <a href="https://www.earli-eapril.org/">https://www.earli-eapril.org/</a>

Prospective participants need a valid EARLI account to submit a contribution. If you do not have an account, you can get it through the EARLI-submission system. Please note that you do not need to be an EARLI-member.

Each individual submission requires

- a title of up to 100 characters (including spaces),
- an abstract of 100-250 words
- an extended summary of 500-1.000 words (including references)
- · optional: up to three images or tables that can be uploaded along with your submission.

All submissions should be done completely anonymously, to ensure a fair review process. Please do not include your name in your abstract or in any of your uploaded documents.

All submissions will be reviewed blindly by at least two experts active within the specific field of research. The extended abstract must address and will be reviewed on the following elements:

- 1. Relevance to the domains of Motivation, Emotion, Metacognition, and/or Self-regulated Learning
- 2. Objectives or purposes
- 3. Theoretical framework, conceptual rationale, or pragmatic grounding
- 4. Research methods and design (empirical contributions) or embeddedness in the relevant literature (theoretical contributions)
- 5. Results and/or substantiated conclusions or warrants for arguments/point of view
- 6. Significance for theory, policy, and practice (empirical contributions) or theoretical debate (theoretical contributions)

Symposia-organizers: Please mind the three-country rule and that all your active participants (i.e. presenting authors, chair(s) and discussant) need an EARLI account. Co-authors do not need an EARLI account since their names and contact details can be entered manually by the submitter.

To find the appropriate keywords for your submission use the drop-down menu in the submission system.

The submission system will be open from October, 15th, 2019 until December, 09th, 2019.
